PLAY Foundation Offers Conduit for Giving to Local Parks & Recreation

Second Open House – Comprehensive Plan Revision

Monday, September 22nd

Columbia City Hall Auditorium

The Columbia Plan Commission invites the community to attend a second event to update the progress made on revising of the City's Comprehensive Plan.

This meeting will address:

- Goals (“community vision”) for the revised Comprehensive Plan
- Review of previous planning efforts
- Presentation of the Community Preservation Plan (Historic Preservation Element)
- Presentation of the Main Street District Plan
- Preview of future planning efforts

Community members may attend at any point during the open house, review information at various stations around the room, and provide input and/or ask questions.

Last revised in 2005, Columbia's Comprehensive Plan is the “master plan” document that guides future development; the plan is being updated to reflect changes in the community as well as in the local, regional and national economy.

**EXPIRED/UNWANTED
PHARMACEUTICAL DRUGS
NATIONAL TAKE BACK DAY**



On Saturday September 27, 2014, from 10am - 2pm the Columbia Police Department, in combination with the DEA, will coordinate a collaborative effort focused on removing potentially dangerous controlled substances from your medicine cabinets. This national take-back day will provide a unified opportunity for the public to surrender expired, unwanted, or unused pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medications to law enforcement officers for destruction. This one-day effort will bring national focus to the issue of pharmaceutical controlled substance abuse. The program provides an opportunity for law enforcement, prevention, treatment and business communities to collaborate and establish a safe collection site for all Americans, regardless of where they live.

Although this event is the National Take Back Day, the Columbia Police Department offers this service 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There is a drop box located in the lobby of the Columbia Police Department to assist with disposing pharmaceuticals all year long.

North Main Resurfacing – Whiteside to Crestview

Bids were received on June 13, 2014 for the North Main Resurfacing Project. As with a large number of bids received on this Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) letting, the bids received exceeded the estimated amount by a substantial amount. In an attempt to have the project constructed in 2014 the project was again placed on the August 1, 2014 IDOT letting to see if additional bids more in line with the estimated amount would be received. Unfortunately the bids received did not change and the bid amounts still exceeded the estimated amount. Therefore the project will be re-evaluated and submitted for a future IDOT letting probably in January 2015. This means the project will not be constructed this calendar year. If an acceptable bid is received in January 2015 the project construction should start in Spring 2015.
