Columbia Residents Urged to "Think Monroe County First!"

The City of Columbia joins the city of Waterloo, as well as the villages of Hecker, Red Bud and Valmeyer, in supporting the "Think Monroe County First! Campaign. Launched November 24th, this campaign's goal is to educate local consumers about the real and valuable benefits of spending first in their home county. The effort is sponsored by the Monroe County Economic Development Council.

Local businesses support our community through employment, sales and property taxes, community service contributions, donations, and more. Local business owners live in



our community, care about our community, and invest in our community. Studies show that 40 cents of every dollar spend locally has local benefits. These dollars finance our local quality of life, making every local purchase a good investment in our community.

If every household in Monroe County spends an additional \$3.50 per day—a couple of sodas, a really good cup of coffee, about a gallon of gas—that it is currently spending outside of the county, local business sales will increase by more than \$18.5 million per year. Monroe County and its municipalities will collect an additional \$232,792 per year in sales tax and (as of January 1st) an additional \$46,558 for levee repairs.

Getting Ready for Snow ...



As the temperature begins to dip and the air becomes brisk the Public Works Department's attention turns to preparing for snow removal activities. Although there is not a great deal anyone can do about the weather, there are certain things to remember about the Public Works Department performing their snow removal activities. Here are a couple of highlights...

- * When snow is in the forecast, if at all possible please remove vehicles from the streets and roadways. In some areas with parked vehicles on the streets and roadways, attempting to navigate a large truck with a snow plow and salt spreader is nearly impossible. The more working room allowed for the trucks and equipment the faster the snow removal activities can take place.
- * Please do not push or throw snow from drives and walks into the street. This is just extra snow to manage plus it may result in calls to the Public Works Department to remove a potential hazard in the street or roadway meaning other snow removal activities have to be put on hold to take care of the potential hazard.
- * During a heavy snowfall event the Public Works Department's first priority is to keep the more heavily traveled streets and roadways open. Secondary and subdivision streets will be accomplished as snow removal activities continue and the rate of snowfall starts to subside.
- * Also during a heavy snowfall event clearing snow to the edge of the street and roadway will take place once the rate of snowfall starts to subside. Plowing and removing snow in cul-de-sac areas is time consuming and tedious and takes away from other snow removal activities. Cul-de-sac areas are one of the last areas to be fully cleared of snow.

The Public Works Department will have the trucks, plows, spreader and equipment ready and the City has already received its first shipment of salt with more to come. We will be ready...are you?

Safety Tips for the Holidays from the Columbia Police Department

To help ensure a safe Holiday season, the Columbia Police Department would like to provide you with some basic safety guidelines to follow.

If you're traveling:

- * Install an automatic timer for the lights in your house to give it the appearance that someone is home.
- * Don't display gifts where they can be seen from the outside.
- * Make sure you lock all your doors and windows when you leave, even if it is for just a few minutes.
- * Contact the Columbia Police Department by calling 281-5151 and let us know the dates you will be gone so that we can provide extra patrol of your residence. Please be able to provide us with a phone number to contact you and an emergency contact name and number should we be unable to reach you.

If you're shopping:

- * Stay alert and be aware of your surroundings.
- * Park in a well lit space, close the windows, lock your car and hide shopping bags, gifts, and purses in the trunk.
- * If you carry a purse, keep it close to your body and not just dangling from a strap. Put your wallet in an inside pocket of your coat.
- * Don't overburden yourself with packages, but be aware of who is watching you when you are dropping packages off in your trunk to go back to your shopping.
- * If you are shopping with kids, teach them to call 9-1-1 or go back to a clerk or store security if you get separated.

If you're going out for the evening:

- * Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like you are home.
- * Be vigilant about locking all doors and windows when you leave, even if it is only for a few minutes.
- * Don't display gifts where they can be seen from the outside.

Utility Billing Direct Debit Is Here!

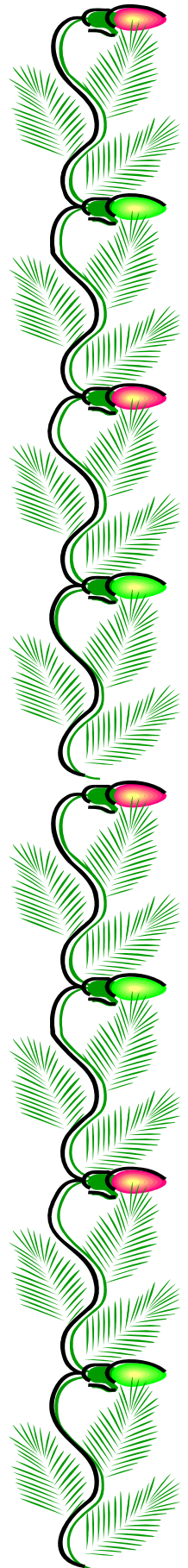
As of October 15, 2008 your City of Columbia utility bill can be directly debited from your checking account each month. This easy and convenient service is free of charge—no more worrying about paying your monthly bill.

If you choose to utilize this service, you will continue to receive your statement around the first of each month showing all of your charges. Then, on the 15th of every month**, your checking account will be automatically debited for the exact amount on your bill.

To initiate this service, visit our website at www.columbiaillinois.com to obtain a form or call the City Clerk's office at City Hall and a form can be mailed to you. You can bring your form in person, submit by mail or put the form in the drop box outside of City Hall.

** If the 15th falls on a Saturday or Sunday the direct debit will take place on the following workday.
